Here's a small sample of songs that use Common Chord Patterns (I use the word “patterns” and “progressions” interchangeably).

I - IV - V

- 12 bar blues which goes: I – I – I – I – IV – IV – I – I – V – IV – I – V.
- Many “Chuck Berry” style rock and roll songs use a variation of the 12 Bar Blues pattern

I – IV – V – IV

I - vi - IV - V (50's Progression)

vi – IV – I – V

- Beginning with the minor chord... sounds darker or sadder than the other four progressions.

 - [Cheap Thrills](#) (Sia)
 - the chorus of [Numb](#) (Linkin Park)

Andalusian Cadence i–VII–VI–V (minor key)

This chord progression is popular. It can be found in songs



such as :
